This extraordinary performance features elaborate costumes, traditiona instruments and unique multiphonic singing wherein the monks simultaneously intone three notes of a chord. The Drepung Loseling monks are particularly renowned for this unique singing. They also utilize traditional instruments such as 10-foot-long dung-chen horns, drums, bells, cymbals and gyaling trumpets. Rich brocade costumes and masked dances, such as the Dance of the Sacred Snow Lion, add to the exotic splendor.

The Tibetan monks will create a sand mandala in the Moraine Valley Library eginning Wednesday, May 6, and concluding Saturday, May 9. From all of





Groups - Discounted prices for most shows are available for groups of 20+.


Policies


